A Prayer for Wisdom and Strength:

Almighty God, of Your fullness grant to us who need so much, who lack so much, who have so often so little faith; grant to us, wisdom and strength. Bring our wills to You. Lift our understanding into Your...light, that, beholding those things which are right, and being drawn to Your love, our will and our understanding might be brought together in Your service, until at last, body and soul and spirit are Yours, and You, our eternal hope and strength through Jesus Christ our Lord.

A Prayer Amidst Trembling:

A Prayer for Clemency:

O blessed Lord and Savior, who has commanded us to love one another, grant us grace that, having received Your undeserved bounty, we may love all persons in You and for You. Love them, O Fountain of love, and make them to love You with all their heart, with all their mind, and with all their soul, that those things only which are pleasing to You they may will, and speak, and do. And though our prayer is cold, because our charity is so little fervent, yet You are rich in mercy. Measure not to them Your goodness by the duliness of our devotion, but as Your kindness surpasses all human affection, so let Your hearing transcend our prayer. Do to them what is expedient for them, according to Your will, that they, being always and everywhere ruled and protected by Your grace, may attain in the end to everlasting life, and to You...be all honor and praise for ever and ever.

#### Violence:

Violence, less and less embarrassed by the limits imposed by centuries of lawfulness, is brazenly and victoriously striding across the whole world, unconcerned that its infertility has been demonstrated and proven many times in history. ### But,... Violence Does Not Live Alone:

But let us not forget that violence does not live alone and is not capable of living alone: It is necessarily interwoven with falsehood. Between them lies the most intimate, the deepest of natural bonds. Violence finds its only refuge in falsehood, falsehood its only support in violence. (One) who has once acclaimed violence as his (or her) method must inexorably choose falsehood as his (or her) principle. At its birth violence acts openly and even with pride. But no sooner does it become strong, firmly established, than it senses the rarefaction of the air around it and it cannot continue to exist without descending into a fog of lies, clothing them in sweet talk. It does not always, not necessarily, openly throttle the throat; more often it demands from its subjects only an oath of allegiance to falsehood, only complicity in falsehood.

#### The Vocation of the Church:

The Church is empowered to live its difficult and painful vocation in the world. The Church is able to do this so long as it is not cut off from its support in worship. A private relationship with Jesus (can) become the focal experience of the Church. Then the weight shifts to the individual. Words of praise are reduced from awe and wonder to what God is able to do "for me." Faith should be understood in terms of what God has done for the world... The Church needs a new word; a hope-filled word, and the language and experience of worship in a world filled with words of pain, hate and alienation. We are called to reclaim the Church's identity, believing that the world is God's and we are God's and our vocation is to act in and for the world, as God has acted in Christ...

The essence of the gospel which gives life to the church lies in the complete involvement of Christ with the world, together with his moral transcendence of it. The doctrine of the church from which all criticism must proceed has in it a dynamic paradox of "no" and "yes." The church that was founded in the incarnation, passion, and resurrection of Christ is not an institution which invariably says yes to the world, nor one which invariably says no. It is as fastidious as the (one) seeking a goodly pearl and as hospitable as the dragnet (Matt. 13:45-47). Therefore if any music is composed or performed with an eye simply to attracting the unconverted, it is likely to fall into the same error we find in the person who, in order to make users of bad language feel at home, uses bad language himself. Similarly, music written or performed by people who select only the most sensitive and best instructed people for disciples will be too much "on its dignity" to help anybody. There needs to be, in composition and choice, a combination of the yes and the no that corresponds as exactly as our sinful nature allows to the yes and no that are in the Word of God... Wherever church music of any kind is associated with operations that bear the marks of what this world calls success (which crudely means exerting an appeal to large numbers of people), a touch of suspicion should creep in....
